ISOBEL FRASER HOME OF REST

OUR last reports have been prefaced by expressions of regret through the death of members of Committee. This, alas! is to be the third in succession.

We all regret the sudden death of Mrs Middleton; she was associated with the work of the old Cottage Home in Charles Street, and continued to be a member of Committee of Viewmount and the present Home. During that long period of years, Mrs Middleton took an active practical interest in the well-being of the old people, whose comfort lay very near her heart. We record our deep sympathy with Mr Middleton and the family in their irreparable loss.

Another member of Committee greatly missed is Mrs Sutherland, who, unfortunately for us, has removed to Liverpool. Mrs Sutherland was, at all times, most enthusiastic in her efforts for the Home and its interests. We wish her much happiness in her new sphere of labour.

ISOBEL FRASER HOME OF REST.

We have now completed a full year's working in the new Home; it has had difficulties in several directions since our last report.

Notwithstanding having had difficulties, we are still in a pretty satisfactory financial position, as our Hon. Treasurer will convince you with his balance sheet. The result of a year's working dispels some misgivings we may have had when launching into the extra heavy burdens of this up-to-date Home. In fact, we are inclined to think our finances inspire confidence for the future. The War conditions will, no doubt, increase our household bills, but if the Home is well filled that should not be serious.

In this connection, we are still faced with the scarcity of male applicants for admission, and not enough cubicle accommodation for the female applicants.

Suggestions have been made to increase lavatory accommodation in one of the male wing cubicles, adapting them for female use by separating one side wing. Meantime, our income continues to be adversely affected.

The Garden Committee, viz., Mrs McAvoy and Mrs Swanston. have fully justified their appointment, whereof the grounds give evidence. The Baroness Burton's gardener, Mr Mackenzie, has been of invaluable assistance with his ready and experienced advice. Baroness Burton, along with other friends, have generously gifted plants.

A sumptuous Christmas dinner was provided by a few kind friends who never forget the old folk under our care in the Home.

New Year's Day dinner arrangements were similar to Christmas Day. Members of Committee and friends attended the New Year's festive board, which was provided by the Ladies' Committee.

During the Spring of this year an unusually large percentage of the old people had bad colds and influenza; fortunately. all recovered, but the epidemic made heavy demands on the staff. The Matron, Miss Anderson, contracted influenza; altogether she was off duty for about three months. Afterwards it was decided not to reinstate Miss Anderson; she was presented with two months wages and board wages.

Nurse Macgregor carried on as Matron during Miss Anderson's disability in a most acceptable manner—an atmosphere of homeliness pervaded everywhere. Nurse Macgregor undertook the duties

of Matron after Miss Anderson went away, until, unfortunately for us, Nurse Macgregor left to be married; not, however, before she saw us comfortably settled with Miss Gray.

Miss Gray took up duty as Matron on 7th August, since when she has concentrated all her energies on making the Home of Rest a real home in the true sense of the word to all those under her care, notwithstanding some exceptional happenings, several of the staff being laid up. In each case temporary help had to be engaged. Also a few of the old people became heavy nursing cases.

Gas masks were provided and fitted in the month of February.

One old lady was admitted to the R.N.I. for eye operation; she returned, and enjoys comparatively good health in spite of her nearly 80 years.

Another old lady received radium treatment at the R.N.I.; it did her a tremendous amount of good.

We have to thank Mr Lees Provan for kindly extracting the teeth of one old man; he stood the ordeal very bravely.

There were 12 admissions during the year—9 women and 3 men. Three deaths occurred during the year—2 women and 1 man. While at 30th September we had 24 women and 11 men in residence, only 2 of the men are in single rooms, 3 women occupy rooms in the men's wing, and 3 rooms in the same wing are empty just now; also 6 male cubicles remain unoccupied.

SPECIAL EFFORTS AND ENTERTAINMENTS.

The first was a Bridge Drive organised by Mrs Thorburn at Muir of Ord—the nett result was £2 10s.

Under the auspices of the Flora Macdonald Y.W.C.A., Miss Skinner organised a Concert, at which our Convener, Mrs D. H. Mackintosh, presided. £5 was thus added to the funds.

Then came the "Historical Pageant," produced by the author of the script, Lady Gough, along with Mrs A. D. Macpherson.

Words fail us to express our gratitude to these two ladies and the vast number of people who gave their services, time and money to help in the production of such an outstanding success in our Highland Capital. It is not very long since Lady Gough consented to become a Vice-President, but in that time she has proved herself to be a live wire in our midst. We do most sincerely thank Lady

Gough, Mrs Macpherson, and all associated with them. Through this special effort our funds benefit by the sum of £305 8s, thus greatly reducing our quota to the Building Fund.

Mrs Munro and Mrs Ward gave their usual tea party.

The East Church gave their tea party, as did also St Andrew's Cathedral. All of these parties are thoroughly enjoyed.

The British Legion gave an evening's entertainment of pipe music. On the last occasion they brought little girl dancers; this gave added pleasure to what is always considered a "gala night," when the British Legion are the entertainers.

Mrs Mowat and Mrs J. Mackenzie, Aberdeen, again provided Easter tea and crackers, as they have done for several years. The function is arranged by Mrs McAvoy and Mrs Swanston.

Messrs Macrae & Dick, Ltd., put two of their large motor coaches at our disposal for a drive. As on former occasions, this firm did not forget our old people. The drive extended to Kilmartin, where Mrs Tinker, in her charming and inimitably generous manner. entertained the happy crowd to a garden tea party. This drive and the hospitality provided food for thought and conversation for a long time.

A generous public continue to supply gifts in kind, helping to reduce our household bills. These gifts are always welcome.

This is the third time collectors have visited a few districts in town. Mrs Young would be glad to receive the name of anyone willing to undertake a district. The public give them subscriptions willingly. Collecting for the Home of Rest is a pleasant task. To each and all of the foregoing, we record our warmest thanks.

Mrs Young continues her service each Sunday afternoon; Miss K. Mackintosh her reading each Monday afternoon; the Town Missionary, Mr Macpherson, and several Ministers are most attentive.

Miss K. Mackintosh has on several occasions deputised for the Hon. Secretary—two years in succession for long periods. This Auxiliary record their grateful thanks to Miss Mackintosh for her readiness to always take on an extra task where needed.

We cannot close our report without voicing our indebtedness to our Hon. Treasurer, Mr W. G. D. Cumming, of Messrs R. Maclean & Co., C.A. No one, perhaps outside the Secretary, can have any idea of the constant work entailed in the treasurership of this organisation. It is carried out quietly, uncomplainingly and most efficiently by our Hon. Treasurer, who is not only interested in our finances, but has the personal concern in the effectiveness of both

sides of our work. We are fortunate in many respects—our treasurership is in the forefront of our good fortune.

We owe a deep debt of gratitude to Dr George Mackenzie, who for several years has most ungrudgingly given his services as Honorary Physician to the Home.

Lastly, our Convener, Mrs D. H. Mackintosh, is an example and inspiration to all associated with her. Nothwithstanding constant pain and disability, she is present regularly at House and Monthly Committees, encouraging everyone by her cheerful smile and Christian principles.

ASSISTED PENSIONS SCHEME.

Before submitting the report on the Assisted Pensions Scheme we have the sad duty of referring to the death of Mr David A. Small, the Central Board Chairman.

Mr D. A. Small was associated with the Aged Christian Friend Society of Scotland over a long number of years; we believe that the late Mr Small's father was one of the number who brought the Aged Christian Friend Society of Scotland into being. The Inverness Auxiliary had not a more enthusiastic supporter than Mr D. A. Small—his interest was practical, his advice sound, and his belief in what "Inverness" could do most sincere.

Mr Small did not miss an opportunity of being present at any and every effort for the benefit of Inverness Auxiliary. We have lost a loyal friend, whose place can not easily be filled.

Our sympathy is extended to Mrs Small and the family in their bereavement.

This is the 33rd Annual Report of the Assisted Pensions Scheme (Inverness Auxiliary). We repeat once again how quietly and unostentatiously this side of our work goes on year after year.

Without the unfailing help of the generous donors among churches and individuals who annually subscribe the £3 necessary to ensure a pension of £6 for the aged pensioner, along with the faithful band of collectors, several of whom have done the vital part of the work for many years, we could not carry on this side of our work. We record our gratitude to the collectors, a generous public, and the parent body in Edinburgh. The latter has always been very kindly disposed toward their offspring in Inverness.

Visiting the aged recipients of this pension, one realises what a great benefit it is to them. As we have remarked before, every case without exception has been sought out; not one of these old people would seek for themselves, yet their need is great. This pension never goes into wrong channels, each pensioner is really

an Aged Christian. In many instances their patient endurance in sickness, and contentment under adverse circumstances, is truly a rebuke to the more fortunate, who too often complain with little reason. One old lady admitted to the Pension Roll rejoiced, because she could now save for her burial; she disliked the thought of being buried by "the Parish."

The number of pensioners on the roll at 30th September, 1938, was 21. Admitted during the year 1; 2 more are pending confirmation by the Edinburgh Directors. There has not been any deaths during the year, so our roll stands at 22 aged pensioners.

This side of the work is just as necessary to help the old folk in their own little corner as to provide that corner in our Home of Rest.

May God continue to prosper our handiwork on behalf of the aged is the earnest prayer of all associated with the twofold aims for a measure of comfort at the eventide of life.

FINANCE, &c.

Messrs R. Maclean & Co., C.A., Hon. Treasurers, submitted the Financial Report, which will be found on another page.

Adoption of the Reports was moved by Lady Hermione Cameron of Lochiel, seconded by Mrs Fraser-Mackenzie of Allangrange.

Both ladies complimented the Hon. Treasurers on being able to give such an excellent Financial Report; they also referred to the Hon. Secretary's Report as emphasising the demand for such a Home of Rest to meet the needs of the Aged in the Northern Counties, but expressed regret that a larger number of old people did not receive the Assisted Pension.

The re-election of Office-Bearers was moved by Mr J. M. Hunter, seconded by Mr Thos. Mackenzie.

The re-election of Committees (en bloc) was moved by Rev. Jas. Wright, M.A., seconded by Mrs Allan Cameron.

Vice-President Mrs David Petrie occupied the chair. She addressed the meeting in a quiet, confident, and charming manner on the work of the Home in days gone by; it refreshed memory for many, recalling the names of those closely associated with Mrs Isobel Fraser, founder of the Cottage Home in Charles Street; the late Mrs Scott, Balwearie; the late Mr F. E. Martin, Ivy Bank, and, of course, Mrs Petrie herself. Many can testify to the whole-hearted interest taken in this worthy cause by the three mentioned who have passed on to their reward. We who know what this Home has meant, and still means, to Mrs Petrie trust we may have her with us for many annual meetings.
